




Two modern trials: Camus' "L'étranger" and Kafka's "Der Proceß" - a comparison

I also question whether it is legitimate to compare Camus L étranger, which is often read alongside his philosophical essay Le Mythe de Sisyph,e to Kafka s Der Proceß, which might be expressive of a philosophy but whose author only ever expressed himself in literary writing. In the following the novels are then compared simultaneously and their similarities and differences examined from different angles, such as their treatment of their common theme of law, guilt and trial in part two, which I see partly under the aspect of the absurd.
